

REQUESTING SESSION PROPOSALS

The American Planning Association's New York Metro Chapter Diversity Committee invites the general public to submit session proposals for Hindsight™, a conference on urban planning through an equity lens. Each year, Hindsight™ honors a significant urban planning and equity-related milestone, to shine light on the discriminatory history of planning and its implicit (and explicit) role in shaping today's inequitable neighborhoods, but also to highlight planning as a means of achieving more inclusive, just, and equitable communities.

In 2017, the first annual conference honored the 100th Anniversary of the supreme court decision Buchanan v. Warley (1917), in which the US Supreme Court invalidated racial zoning on 14th Amendment grounds. The 2018 conference honors the 50th Anniversary of the Fair Housing Act (1968), which outlawed housing discrimination for certain protected classes, and requires jurisdictions to address segregation and disparate access to opportunity - affirmatively further fair housing. The day-long event will focus on diversity and social equity not solely as a topic at a conference, but as a lens through which all planning and community development should be implemented. Session proposals for this conference should reflect on the theme and ensure a diversity of panelists and speakers. Please follow the guidelines stated in the following pages. Proposals are due August 31, 2018 by 5pm September 7, 2018 by 5pm and proposal teams will be notified of selection by September 28, 2018.

The 2018 Hindsight[™] Conference Committee strongly encourages submissions for session proposals from across the nation and interested parties around the world. However, unfortunately at this time we are not able to provide honorariums or compensation for travel or lodging accommodations for participants.

Outlawed housing discrimination for certain protected classes, and requires jurisdictions to address segregation and disparate access to opportunity

About the 1968 Fair Housing Act

Throughout American history, various private and government actors have used discriminatory real estate and land use practices, including violence, to segregate people based on race. Historic housing discrimination has served as the pinnacle to reinforcing racial inequality in the United States, by enabling White Americans to own homes, build wealth, access healthy neighborhoods, and maintain resources, while denying opportunities and perpetuating intergenerational poverty for Black and Brown Americans. Fifty years ago, in 1968, shortly after the assassination of Martin Luther King Jr., the federal government established the Fair Housing Act. This Civil Rights legislation prohibits discrimination in the sale, rental, financing, or other housing-related transaction based on race, color, national origin, religion, sex, familial status, and disability. The act not only outlaws discrimination, but also requires jurisdictions that receive federal funding to "affirmatively further fair housing." In 2015, the Obama administration issued a final rule to enforce this requirement to, clarifying that affirmatively furthering fair housing (AFFH) means that jurisdictions need to take meaningful actions to "overcome patterns of segregation and the denial of access to opportunity that are part of this nation's history." The new rule requires jurisdictions to conduct fair housing planning, acknowledging that they impact community as a whole and requiring community participation in that planning process.



PROPOSAL GUIDELINES

All sessions must be completed in 60 minutes (with the exception of [in-sight] · visits) including time for questions, but can be structured however proposal applicants see fit. All proposed sessions should address planning and urban policy's role in working towards more inclusive, just, and equitable communities. Proposals of a variety of topics, including interdisciplinary topics, are encouraged. Diversity of speakers is also strongly encouraged, including diversity in professions (not limited to planners), sectors, race, ethnicity, gender identity, age, national origin, cultures, abilities, and other groups representing underrepresented backgrounds in city and regional planning. Speakers may also present remotely via video conferencing (please note in description). Proposals are not limited to lecture/panel style. Interactive sessions (workshop-style, skill-building, etc.) and visual media are also strongly encouraged. Projector, computer, and AV will be provided. If proposal teams require additional materials for more interactive workshops, please be prepared to bring your own.
